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THE CORONATION

An Essay by **MIKE KINNEY**,
Teamster and Editor

Paris, July 14th, 1911.

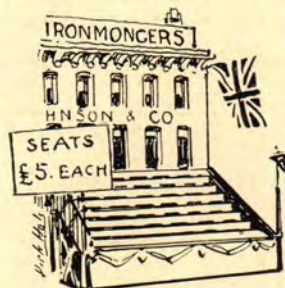
THIS old world of ours is full of contrasts. On June 22d I saw the King of England on his way to be crowned in Westminster Abbey in London. I am writing about it in Paris, on July 14th—the French national holiday celebrating the fall of the Bastille and the end of the French monarchical form of government.

The American papers have been full of descriptions of the coronation. It would take reams of paper to tell all I saw. I guess all you want me to write are a few impressions. I will try to boil it down. I will trust to your imagination to fill in the gaps.

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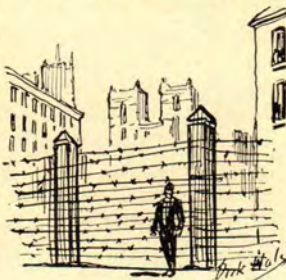
London was not especially crowded. The Americans were "stung" by the high prices at Edward VII's funeral, so this time they gave London a wide berth. The fronts of stone and brick stores were taken down to arrange for



seats. Seats sold at an average of £5 (\$25.00) each for the Coronation procession (short one, on June 22d), and about £3 on the next day for the Royal Progress. They were about half filled. Hotels doubled rates that week. A fair supper with a drink or two, at a good hotel, set you back \$5.00 a plate. The streets were barricaded as if London expected a revolution. The streets were full of soldiers

and the rank and file were a sorry looking bunch. The officers were good looking men and rode fine horses. I never saw a better looking lot of horses at one time. But it was amusing to see some of the poor little English fellows trying to look imposing under the weight of helmets and breast plates. We were sorry for them. As they lined up and waited in the streets the privates smoked their pipes while the officers consumed countless cigarettes.

London streets are very narrow, and are filled with swift running taxicabs. The air is always full of the smell of gasoline and burning oil. You never get

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away from it in London, night or day. Cabs are very cheap—the cheapest thing in town.



We had no seats the first day. It rained in spots. We sauntered out about ten o'clock in the morning and saw the whole show from the street. All the carriages were closed and the mounted and unmounted soldiers looked bored and peevish. The state carriages were gorgeous, and most of them had footmen (two) standing behind. They were all dressed in fancy liveries. This time I only caught a glimpse of the King and Queen through the glass of the coach. The parade soon passed and we walked down to Trafalgar Square and mixed with the crowd. How different from an American street crowd! Poor people—most of them looked miserable. They were dirty and poorly dressed. I never saw such a dirty lot of people in my life. Their cheers were all faint. They "minded" a policeman like little children.

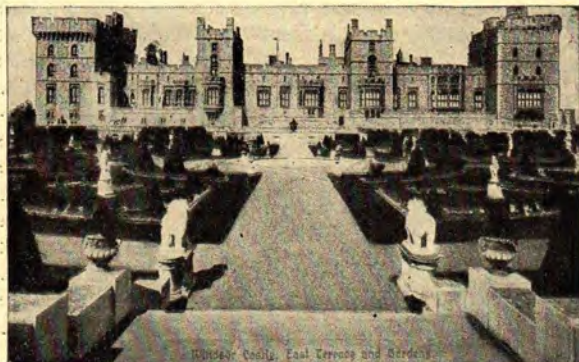

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monument to Nelson and looked around at the other monuments. Almost all to soldiers. Most of them killed in some of England's battles. There stood poor "Chinese Gordon." In the British Museum the day before I had read his last letter written from Khartoum just before he was killed. I copied it in my note book. Here it is word for word:



An English "Bobby"

December 14, 1885.

Now mark this. If Expeditionary force, and I ask for no more than 200 men, does not come in ten days—the town may fall—and I have done my best for the honor of our country. Good bye. C. G. Gordon.

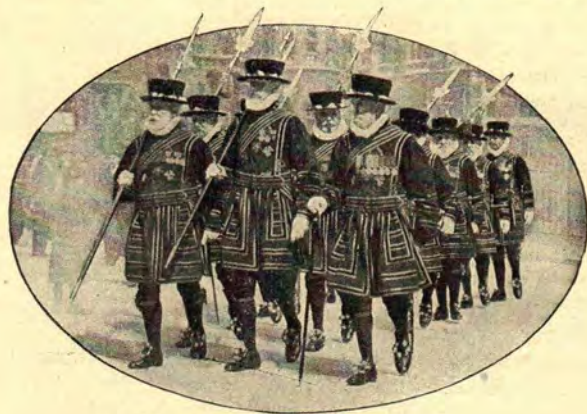
You send me no information

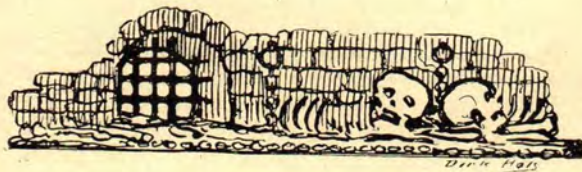
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London, to one who has read its history, is a city of tragic memories. Often I would walk out of some dark



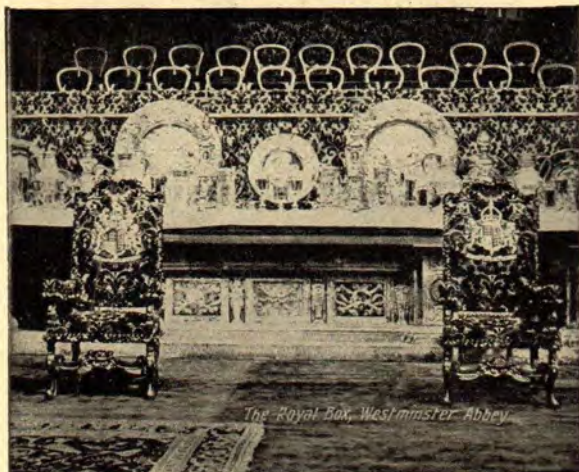

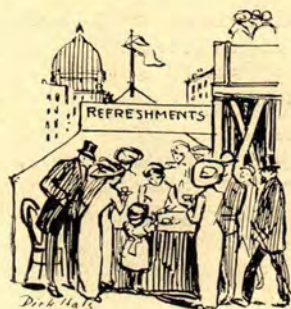

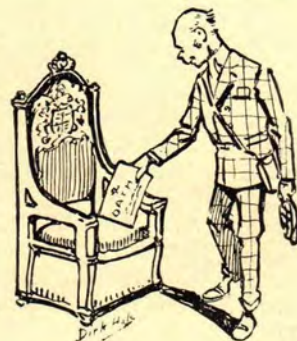

WHERE THE KING WAS CROWNED

Story of the Famous Stone
of Scone and description of the Chair.

THE Stone of Scone, the Coronation Stone as it now exists, under the seat of the identical chair made for it by order of Edward I., has at each extremity an ancient iron fitting for handles; on it is cut a rectangular groove, fourteen inches long and nine inches wide, in which, no doubt, was once set the plate of brass or bronze engraved with the "fatal" Latin inscription:

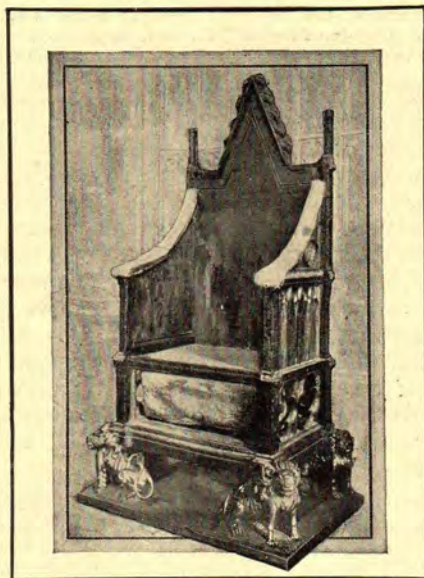
Ni fallat fatum, Scoti quocunque locatum,
Invenient lapidem regnare tenentur ibidem.

Translated thus:

If fates goe right where ere this stone is pight
The regall race of Scots shall rule that place.

It is a block of reddish sandstone, which might have been taken from almost any of the red sandstone districts of western or eastern Scotland. It perfectly resembles some of the sandstones of the district around Scone. It is almost certainly of Scottish origin, quarried out of one of the sandstone districts between the coast of Argyll and the mouths of the Tay and Forth, but there is no clue in the stone itself to fix precisely its original source.

The legendary history of this famous Stone, seated over which King George was crowned, as all his predecessors since the time of Edward I. have been, is extremely curious, intimately associated as it is with the legendary history of the Scottish nation. Rishanger, in his "Chronica et Annales" (1327), describing the coronation of John Balliol, says that he was placed upon the regal stone which Jacob placed under his head when he went from Beersheba to Haran. The "Cronicon Rythmicum" and Fordun state that Gaythelus, the Greek, brought the stone called lapis Pharaonis—Pharaoh's stone—from

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Egypt. Earlier still, in 1301, Baldred Bisset says that it was Scota the daughter of Pharaoh, Gaythelus' wife, who brought with her the royal seat and conquered the Picts.

The Scots historians identified the Stone—the Stone of Scone as it then was—with the "Lia Fail" or "Stone of Destiny," at Tara, in Ireland. Fordun says that when Simon Brech, in B. C. 697, brought the Stone with him from Spain to Ireland, "he placed it in the most eminent place of the kingdom called Themor (Teamar or Tara), which became the royal seat and principal place of the Kingdom of Ireland." On the Stone on the Hill of Tara the Kings of Ireland were placed, and if the chief was a true successor the Stone was silent, if a pretender it groaned aloud with a sound as of thunder. Irish antiquarians, however, maintained that the "Lia Fail" remained at Tara.

Of the venerable chair, the stout English oak in which the Celtic stone is enclosed, the history is well known. It has an authentic pedigree, attested by contemporary documents. Edward I. intended at first that the chair should be of bronze, and Adam, the King's craftsman, had begun it when the King decided it should be wood. Of wood it accordingly was—good English oak, which, in spite of time and ill-usage, is still sound and strong. One hundred shillings were paid for the making of it, forty shillings for the painting and gilding, and the making of a covering, and thirteen and fourpence for two "leopards" in wood. The cost in modern money was therefore about one hundred and fifty pounds. A magnificent piece of furniture it must have been when fresh from the hands of "Master Walter the painter." Many years ago, Mr. Burges, the architect, made a careful examination of the

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remains of the ancient painting and gilding then visible. There remained enough to show that the chair was heavily gilded, and that it was decorated with a beautiful diaper of birds and plants; a grand painting of an enthroned king, presumably Edward himself, occupied the back panel. Mutilated, defaced, desecrated by the ignoble carved initials and names of cockney sight-seers, the chair is almost as rough and rugged now as the mystic stone of which it is the shrine.

Such, then, are the Coronation Stone and the Coronation Chair—the Royal Throne of Great Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions beyond the seas—the Seats of Royal and Imperial Dignity.

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THE CROWN OF THE KING

This exact description of the Historical Emblem of Kingship is from the Records of the Keeper of the Regalia in the Tower of London.



THE "Crown of State" is the Imperial Crown which was made for the late Queen Victoria in 1838. According to the official record kept in St. Thomas' Tower at the Tower of London by the Keeper of the Regalia, it was constructed from certain jewels found in old and disused crowns, together with many others which were supplied by Queen Victoria, and which since then have been considerably supplemented. But the Imperial Crown, as it originally left the hands of its makers, is thus described in the Official Records of the Keeper of the Regalia:

"DIAMOND EDGE IS A QUALITY PLEDGE"

"The lower part of the band and above the ermine border consists of a row of one hundred and twenty-nine pearls, and the upper part of the band a row of one hundred and twelve pearls, between which, in front of the Crown, is a large partly drilled sapphire, surrounded by six small rose diamonds, purchased for the Crown of H. M. George IV. At the base is a sapphire of smaller size, and six other sapphires, three on each side, between which are eight emeralds. Above and below the seven sapphires are fourteen diamonds, and surrounding these eight emeralds and one hundred and twenty-eight diamonds. Between the emeralds and the sapphires are the sixteen trefoil ornaments containing one hundred and sixty diamonds. Above the band are eight sapphires surmounted by eight diamonds, and between which are eight festoons consisting of one hundred and forty-eight diamonds.

"In the front of the Crown, and in the center of the Maltese Cross, is the famous ruby said to have been given to Edward, Prince of Wales (called the Black Prince), by Don Pedro, King of Castile, after the battle of Alajena, near Vittoria, A.D. 1367. This ruby was worn in the helmet of Henry V. at the battle of Agincourt in 1415. It is pierced quite through, after the Eastern custom, the upper part of the piercing being filled up by a small ruby. Above this ruby, to form the cross, are seventy-six brilliant diamonds.

"Three other Maltese Crosses, forming the two sides and back of the Crown, have emerald centers, and contain respectively one hundred and thirty-two, one hundred and twenty-four and one hundred and thirty brilliant diamonds. Between the four Maltese Crosses are four ornaments in the form of the French fleur-de-lis, with four rubies in the center, and surrounded by rose diamonds containing respectively eighty-six, eighty-six and eighty-seven rose

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diamonds. From the Maltese Crosses issue four Imperial Arches, composed of oak leaves and acorns. The leaves contain seven hundred and twenty-eight rose, table and brilliant diamonds. Thirty-two pearls form the acorns set in cups containing fifty-four rose diamonds and one table diamond. The total of diamonds in arches and acorn is one hundred and eight brilliants, one hundred and sixteen table and five hundred and fifty-nine rose diamonds.

"From the upper part of the arches are four large pear-shaped pearls, with rose-diamond caps containing twelve rose diamonds, and stems containing twenty-four very small rose diamonds. Above the arches stands the Mound, containing in the lower hemisphere three hundred and four brilliants and in the upper hemisphere two hundred and forty-four brilliants. The zone and arc are composed of thirty-three rose diamonds. The Cross on the summit has a rose-cut sapphire in the center, surrounded by four large brilliants and one hundred and eight smaller brilliants."

This ends the official description of the Imperial State Crown, as it was made for the late Queen, with a total of three thousand and ninety-three stones. To this, during her reign, the Koh-i-noor was added. This has now been replaced by the oblong "Star of Africa" (one of the two portions into which the Cullinan diamond was cut), which weighs three hundred and nine and five-sixteenths carats. The Imperial Crown, in its original form, weighed thirty-nine ounces and five dwts. troy.

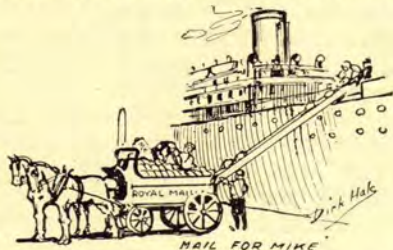
The managing director assured me that no one individual in all their history had ever received so many postals and letters. "It's quite without precedent," said he. Then he informed me that to have so much mail was not quite fair to them. They were not used to it. It threw them quite out of their regular routine, etc., etc., etc. I told him what a great "ad" it was for the bank. "But," sez he, "we don't want any ads; we are quite content with our business as it is now—quite."

Then sez I, "I'm very sorree (you know I had learned to say 'thank you' with a rising inflection and 'sorree' with a falling inflection my first day in Lunnon), but I'm quite jolly willing to pay all the extra costs." Oh, dearest, how the clouds on his face did clear away! Oh, darling, how a little ready money does help over here!

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You see a whole lot of the feeble minded readers of *The Gimlet*, instead of putting 2 cents on the postals, as I asked and respectfully urged, just used a 1-cent stamp, and of course the English post-office wanted an extra half-penny on each of these cards. But I deposited £5 (\$25.00) to cover postage and extra work, and Mike Kinney's stock went above par in the London market.



What was I to do with all the mail. There were 10,000 postal cards alone and more coming on every steamer.

Now you know I always tell you the plain, unvarnished truth. So here goes: I knew the "Managing Director" of the Hearst papers in London—Mr. John Schroers—so I went to him. He referred me to W. H. Smith & Son, the great London printers, 53 Fetter Lane. I arranged with them to buy the coronation cards, to print my greetings in my own handwriting, to address and mail the cards to all my feeble minded friends in "Amurica."

I read every card and letter sent me. It took most of a week's time. Say, it was fun to read those cards. Many were from old hardware friends I had not seen for years, a lot were from hardware clerks, and quite a bunch were from

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young ladies (say, is my tie on straight?), but the sweetest of all came in the cramped handwriting of little children. *They were all answered.* I hope each and all of you have received your card.

Many wanted cards from other countries. I have these arranged in my grip and as I visit each of these countries I will mail the proper card.

It is interesting that next to England the greatest number of calls were for post cards from *Switzerland*; then came Germany.

It was the largest individual order for coronation post cards placed in England. It was the first time on record that such an idea had been carried out.

What did it cost? Now there you are! As they say in France, "Combien?"—how much? Well, dearest, it was a good many hundred dollars. Each answer cost five cents for card, stamp, and cost of addressing and printing. So far 10,000 answers have been mailed, and when I return to London there will be a final report and settlement.

But what of it! Life passes. There is no measure in cold dollars and cents of the pleasure I have received, and I sincerely trust I have given, in these thousands of greetings of love, good will and innocent fun that have come to me across the wide ocean from thousands of men, women and children in all parts of the United States, and that have gone back to them.

So, dearly beloved—because the longer I stay over here, the more I love every single American—here's to you. I wish you health, happiness and some one to love!

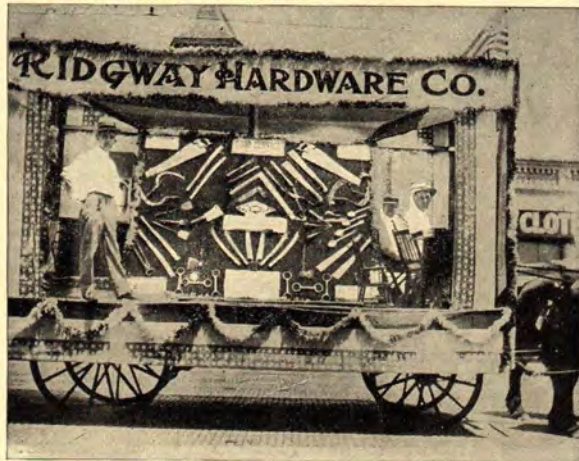

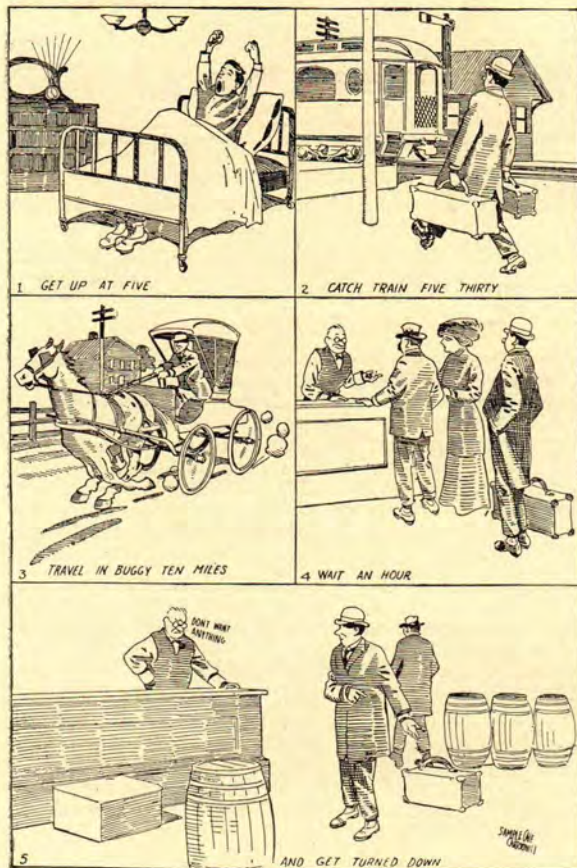

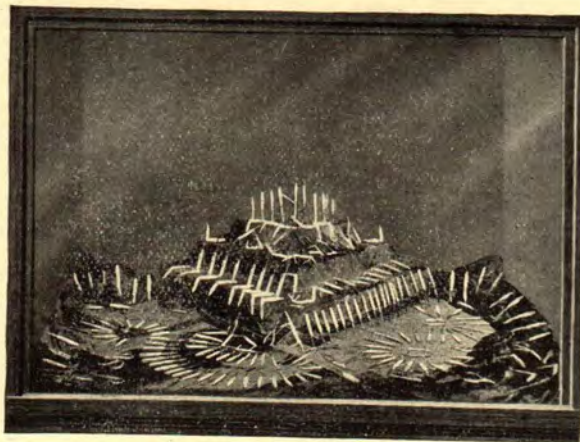
What is a gentleman? Is it a thing
